

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Order of Christian Funerals states, "at the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of baptism and strengthened at the eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end nor does it break the bonds forged in life. The Church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting word of God and the sacrament of the eucharist." (4) We, and the soul of our beloved, benefit from the rites of the Church but increasingly there are more frequently set aside in parts of American culture today.

I take this occasion to again encourage you, our priests, deacons and parish staffs, to be forthright in recommending our four diocesan Catholic Cemeteries in those instances where the parish does not provide a cemetery. For reference, see pages 18-19 of the 2024-2025 diocesan directory. Unlike many other for-profit cemeteries which often change ownership and oversight, our Catholic cemeteries remain with reliable unchanged ownership, on-going endowed perpetual maintenance, and decades of respectful burial recordkeeping. Our responsibility perdures over decades and centuries. It remains holy ground.

In recent years the practice of cremation has grown. Please assist the faithful and their families in teaching and preaching that "the ancient Christian custom [remains] to bury or entomb the bodies of the dead; cremation is permitted, unless it is evident that cremation was chosen for anti-Christian motives." (19) The cremated remains, preferably after the body is present for the Church's rites (cf., 413-414, 418)—but acceptable to have the cremated remains present for a funeral Mass (415), are to be treated with the same respect given the human body, including the use of a worthy vessel, manner and care in placement, transport and final disposition. Part of the reason our Catholic cemeteries remain so vitally important is that they call to mind the resurrection of the dead and offer a fitting place to focus the Church's remembering of the dead and offering of prayer for them. Thus, our Church continues in teaching that "the cremated remains should be buried in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium. The practice of scattering cremated remains on the sea, from the air, or on the ground, or keeping cremated remains in the home of a relative or friend of the deceased are not the reverent disposition that the Church requires." (417; cf., DDF, *Ad resurgendum cum Christo*, 3-7) Thank you for your efforts to instruct our people on this topic.

Finally, in this month of November when we celebrate All Souls and pastorally remember our beloved dead, it continues to be a salutary practice for us to recommend our Catholic cemeteries to our parishioners, family and friends—as holy ground until the final day of our Lord's return. May the souls of all the faithful departed, rest in peace.
